November brought rejuvenation of the Memory Tree and remembering gamekeepers/stalkers and ghillies throughout the UK. We remember them.








GWT Support Grant





Helping us

In Spring 2022 Ronald Rose completed A Walk with Shaun - walking from one end of Scotland to the other in 24 days, covering over 480 miles. As well as raising vital funds for the Gamekeepers' Welfare Trust (GWT) in their Year of the Gamekeeper, he has generated invaluable awareness among his peers of the assistance the GWT provides.

Ronald lost his much-valued friend and colleague in 2019 when Shaun took his own life and walked in his memory. "Given the work the GWT does to support those in our industry, I wanted to use the trek to fundraise for the GWT and raise awareness about the help available for those struggling with their wellbeing in general, as well as those who consider taking their own life." Ronald, a Wildlife Ranger Manager for Forestry & Land Scotland, is from a long line of deer and wildlife managers.



Despite many years in this line of work, or perhaps because of it, he doesn't take the personal challenges lightly: long hours, challenging

weather, solitary working, and more. "It's OK not to be OK. And it's more than OK, it's the strong thing to do, to tell a family member, a trusted friend or work colleague, or specialists like the Gamekeepers' Welfare Trust, about what problems you are facing and how you are feeling."



Almost at the same time at the end of April Helen travelled throughout the UK on "Helen's Way", travelling by every means of transport keepers have used from ponies to quad bike, boat and much more! Meeting so many keepers on estates and shoots providing a huge variety of sport, habitat and conservation it was a fascinating insight to the challenges and the rewards which keepers, ghillies and stalkers experience every day. A big thank you to everyone who helped her on her way and supported the cause most generously.


